Alaska's Instream Flow Law

- Defined 4 categories of instream uses as a beneficial use available for appropriation as a reservation of water.
- Any person, agency, or organization can file for a reservation.
- At least once every 10 years, DNR reviews the reservation to determine if the use or purpose(s) still exists.





Lack of Stream Gages
